
QUALITY AREA 3: Physical Environment MTOP Outcome 3: Wellbeing

Our Their Care PET WALL has been an exciting addition to our displays with children bringing in photos of themselves and their animals to add to it! This has sparked lots of conversation about our extended furry families that we love.

Upon reflection on our play spaces, we purchased cardboard sensory dividers from ZartArt to section of our homework area and sensory play area to create zones of minimal distraction and to support our children who want to reduce noise and sensory input if they're feeling overwhelmed. We purchased a lightbox which we used with sand and a paintbrush for the ultimate mindfulness activity.

Lastly, we are collecting resources for our 'insect hotel'. Children have chosen to start with a snail sanctuary next term and have been researching everything snails need to thrive.









HIGHLIGHT ROOM UPDATES

HIGHLIGHT -CULTURAL AWARENESS AND ROGRAMMING-

Our programming has included many cultural and special event activities including our Valentines Day shout out wall where children gave acknowledgments to special people in their lives. We made lanterns for Chinese New Year and had a picnic for the planet on Earth Hour day to raise awareness for sustainability and our natural environment.

We have included many different cuisines in our programming and afternoon tea menu, including a DIY nacho day in the school holidays. Children topped their nachos with jalapenos, sour cream, guacamole, corn, kidney beans, salsa, olives, and cheese!

We have made ramen, udon, dumplings, Japanese curry, Indian curry, and have even incorporated some French pastries into our afternoon tea menu. Our recipes have come from the school cookbook, the foodbank cooking class resource and donated cookbooks from our families.

HIGHLIGHT -EXTENSION TO LEARNING-

We have been focussing on extending out children's learning this term by creating specific activities based around our observations of their interests. Many of our children love to investigate our yard space and create bug hotels and temporary snail shelters. After discussion with our children, we will be investigating keeping a pet snail next term and have already started collecting the resources we need including a donated fish tank from our art teacher at Glen Huntly.

We also experimented with different layouts for our 'Steiner', sensory and mindfulness spaces by separating tables and creating zones fir our plastic animals / dinosaurs and lightbox activities to find the perfect setup.

Extension stem activities have included making bubble machines, gardening, playdough, and creating all kinds of creations with our new modular play couch!
