


Figure 2: Making airdry Clay cultural flags for Olympics Week


HIGHLIGHT ROOM UPDATES






Figure 1: Welcoming Sam Shelton to our staff

This term, we have done some explicit learning / circle talks around kindness, how to treat our resources responsibly, expectations at TheirCare, and reminders about routines. Examples have been 'which bins do we use for what?', how we can use tape, paper and other non-reusable resources sustainably and to reduce waste? We have done a bin audit and quizzed the kids on where items should be put away and how.

We also did a big group discussion about how to be a good friend using the 'Friendship Soup' recipe. Children brainstormed ideas and we talked about what they can do if they feel that someone is not being a good friend.

Examples of the items we spoke about include: Kind words, gentle bodies, safe hands, understanding, tolerance, compassion, different ways of learning. Strengths, weaknesses.

What to do if someone breaks the Friendship Recipe: Walk away, Take a breath, Tell a teacher, Use our words.

Our excursion to the Melbourne Gaol was a huge highlight, with many of our children fascinated with the history of the court. They LOVED role playing the trial of Ned Kelly, and had many questions to ask about the judicial system in the 'olden days'.

Our seniors have been taking on lots of leadership roles this term and proving they are excellent role models for our younger children.

Our kitchen pass and homework area pass lanyards (pictured in pink) have been working well to designate areas for children to extend their skills.

From cooking in the kitchen (supervised) to completing their homework and group projects, to using the hot glue gun with gloves (supervised), and using the hairdryer to dry their own artwork, our children have proved that they can be trusted to listen to instructions and to keep themselves safe while learning new life skills.

Our Children's Council Meetings still meet once a week to vote on decisions regarding the running of the service, to come up with menu and programming ideas, and to talk about any issues they have noticed with daily routines. This has led to educators considering modifications in activities to accommodate.


